Armin joined the World Bank in 1993 in the Latin America and Caribbean (LAC) Region. He moved to the Europe and Central Asia Region in 1997 and became Manager for Health, Nutrition, Population, responsible for the Bank's health strategy, lending and technical assistance, including analytical and advisory work in the European Union, the New Member States and the countries of the former Soviet Union. From 2008 – 2014, Dr. Fidler was the Lead Advisor for Health Policy and Strategy in the Bank's Human Development Network, responsible for global health policy, international health partnerships, Health Reform in Middle Income Countries and cross-cutting "Health in All Policies", such as in the areas of Climate Change, Water and Sanitation or Road Traffic Injuries. From 2013 Dr Fidler became the elected President for the European Health Management Association (EHMA), an organisation that aims to build the capacity and raise the quality of health management in Europe.

Fidler holds a Doctor of Medicine Degree (MD) from the University of Innsbruck, Austria, a Diploma

in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene from the Bernhard Nocht Institute, Hamburg, Germany and Master of Public Health (MPH) and Master of Science (MSc.) degrees in Health Policy and Management, both from Harvard University's School of Public Health. He also earned certificates in Management from the Harvard Business School and in Public Finance and Welfare Economics from the London School of Economics and Political Science.
